Use of the NNU library & its resources

As a Concurrent Credit instructor you are added to the NNU Riley library system when we receive notice from the NNU CC Program administrator that you have been approved. You are welcome to use the library and its resources. Check our website for hours, to search our online catalog, and also view your account and renew online.

If you plan to check out materials, bring your NNU photo ID card with you. Your NNU photo ID card is your library card. Your NNU ID number and your first and last name can be used to gain remote access to the NNU online databases provided by the library. However, ***please note that the full text articles in these databases can be used for your professional development and preparation ONLY.*** Downloading and distributing full text articles from these databases to your students either electronically or in print is not within our license agreements with the database providers.



Resources for your students

We urge you to contact the librarian in the school where you are teaching to find out what is available for your students. Many states have provided online databases with full text similar to those held by our library that can be used by any school or public library card holder of that state. If your school librarian is not familiar with these, please contact me and I'll be happy to find out what is available to the students in your school.

Your students are welcome to use the NNU Library. We provide a borrower card, free of charge, to any high school junior or senior attending local schools. Our license agreements do not permit us to extend to them remote access to our online databases. However, we have workstations where they can search and print these resources when they are visiting the library building in person.

Library instruction

If you and your students are within driving distance of a college library you might wish to bring your class for a visit. We think exposure to a college or university library is a great way to help high school students see college as an option for their future. And use of the library and its resources is known to be one of the keys to success for college freshmen.



College libraries are busy places and visits from high school classes are a common occurrence, so please call or email the librarians in advance and let them know you're coming. They are anxious to work with you on a plan that is tailored to your needs. One of the librarians can pull materials in advance, create a bibliography of suggested materials for the project, or talk to your students about good research strategies that include both print and online resources.
