Where do you fit?

This continuum represents the range of eating behaviors and attitudes towards food and body image. The goal is to function in the "Concerned in a Healthy Way" category, which reflects good physical and emotional health. In college, some students slip into the "Food Preoccupied" and "Disruptive Eating" categories due to the new stresses and pressures of the college environment. Others stop caring about food and their bodies at all, because of time and cost constraints. No matter where you fit, there are resources on (and off) campus to help.

I prefer to eat alone.</p>
